I want to share with you that Rainbows recently expanded one of its services to Sumner County. We are now providing Infant/Toddler Services to families in Sumner County who

have children birth to age 3 needing therapy interventions.

Last March, the State Department of Health and Environment asked Rainbows to consider taking over these Infant/Toddler services in Sumner County. The agency who had previously provided these early intervention services was no longer able to continue to do so. Just as we began discussions, COVID-19 hit our area and all of that was set aside.

In May after obtaining program data and financial information, Rainbows' Board discussed this opportunity. After careful consideration, our Board approved of Rainbows expanding Infant/Toddler Services into Sumner County. As one Board Member summed it up, "If families and children need services and we can do it, then we should". So even during a pandemic, Rainbows' Board continues to "Make Children and Families our highest priority".

As we enter into this season of thankfulness and giving, please remember Rainbows in your plans. In a few weeks, we will be mailing our Appeal for end of year giving. We'll be sharing about the work that has continued throughout the pandemic and how you can continue to be a part of filling the gap to fund these critical services going forward.

As we have navigated through COVID-19, Rainbows has kept three critical keys as our focus: 1) protect the well-being of our staff and individuals served; 2) maintain services; and 3) sustain the financial stability of Rainbows. We will continue to function in this way so services to more than 3,800 children and their families can continue in the years to come.
