in order to support services at Rainbows United! They are an outstanding group of ladies who are committed to the event and what Rainbows does to help children and families in our community.

The program service we feature for Blarney Breakfast is **Targeted Case Management** or TCM. When we explain what TCM is, we say that it provides personal assistance in finding and securing the programs, services, and financial aid for children, birth through age 17, with special needs and their families. In other words, we walk alongside families as they navigate the multiple systems and funding sources while helping connect families to critical resources for their child or children with special needs.

For these families, coordination of the systems and resources can be a full time job. **The targeted case manager is a critical link for families**. Some of the items that a TCM can help families secure funding for include wheelchairs, van modifications, technology such as iPads, home modifications such as a ramp, bathroom remodel, or "lift" system in order to safely

move their child. It may be funding for a summer Camp so families can work or gas money in order to travel to a specialist out of the area. A targeted case manager also attends meetings with the families if they request help in advocating and understanding the many systems that impact children with special needs.

Rainbows is the only agency in the Greater Wichita area that provides TCM exclusively to children. **We recognize that working with children and families is our specialty** so we focus our work for this population.

Funding for Targeted Case Management consists of Medicaid, United Way of the Plains, and fundraising through donations, and of course the Blarney Breakfast. Also, through the funds generated at Blarney Breakfast we are able to purchase some much needed items for the children and families we serve.

By attending the Blarney Breakfast, you not only have a great and crazy time, **you are** also helping the more than 530 children we serve through Rainbows, Target Case Management program. Come join the fun on March 17th!


